

## **Eyre Peninsula Camera Clubs Get Together 2024.**

The wonderful exhibition of 36 talented Eyre Peninsula photographers' work, held at Breeze Bistro over the last month, is now over.

The exhibition culminated in the annual Eyre Peninsula Camera Clubs get together, over the weekend of 16-17<sup>th</sup> March.
